

Two minute read from the Health and Care Partnership Board Mental Health, Learning Disabilities & Neurodiversity on Tuesday 17 May

Update on the development session, which took place on 8 March

Some members of the board have put their names forward to be part of the task and finish group. The group will work through the themes identified from the session and will bring a proposal back to the board at a future meeting.

Autism stocktake

The new template format for autism was well received by the board, as it helps to capture the current landscape and operating models. It was agreed that the learning disability programme would try this new template format and bring to the next board meeting in July.

Three-year development plan for learning disability and autism programme

An update was provided to the board for the funding allocated for over the three years as the programme is now moving into year two.

Special educational needs and disability (SEND) inspection improvement delivery plans for children and young people

The SEND inspection took place week commencing 7 March. The final draft of the inspection report was received on 6 May from Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission, and we have until 20 May to submit any factual inaccuracies in the report. We don't have an exact date of when the report will be published, likely to be 23 May but this could change. Once the report is received, we have 70 days to develop an action plan on how we will address areas of improvement and we will be monitored externally every 90 days. The action will go to the SEND Strategic Partnership Board for a sign off on 19 July, this may change depending on when the final report is published.

Launch of the children's and young people's dynamic support register

Changing the name of the children's and young people's dynamic support register to children's and young people's dynamic support co-ordination, this is based on the feedback received from parents and carers.

There will be two groups of children on the register, the first is around the transforming care agenda which is around children and young people with a learning disability, neurodiversity, and autism. The second is around children and young people who need the intensive support requirement, who've had multiple breakdowns of care.

BANDS (Bradford/Airedale neurodevelopment service)

Conversations have been taking place with South West Yorkshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust to take 100 cases on our current case load and waiting list.

There are also discussions taking place with South West Yorkshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust on a partnership model, they're keen on developing a clinical model and look at how they can deliver at place with the possibility of having joint posts. This will be a medium to long term plan over the next 6 to 12 months.

The board has agreed to go back to Health and Social Care Overview and Scrutiny Committee to provide them with an interim position statement, so that they have assurance on the revised plan.

Office for Health Improvements and Disparities (OHID) Concordat for Better Mental Health

The purpose of the concordat is to get commitment to prevention of mental illness from organisations. There is a consensus statement, which is built on five pillars and people / organisations (or as a system) are being encouraged to sign up to this.

An action plan has been developed so that as a system we can sign up to the concordat. The board is supportive of the concordat and comments to be received by 31 May on the action plan.

Programme updates

Acute crisis and liaison mental health

Core 24 is now operating in both hospitals (Airedale NHS Foundation Trust and Bradford Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust) and the new crisis alternative service is due to start on 31 July (Cellar Trust and Mind in Bradford).

Community mental health events

The events will be taking place over the next few weeks, which will start in PCN6 and we're starting to work with PCN7.
