There is a 90 % probability of Heat-Health criteria being met between 0800 on Thursday and 2100 on Friday in parts of England.

An update will be issued when the alert level changes in any region. Alerts are issued once a day by 0900 if required and are not subject to amendment in between standard issue times. Note that the details of the forecast weather are valid at the time of issue but may change over the period that an alert remains in force. Heat-Health Alert

General Comments:-

Temperatures exceeding 30C were observed quite widely across the UK on Wednesday, with 32.6C observed in London. Similar temperatures, perhaps a degree or two higher expected quite widely Thursday, with only the far north remaining less hot.

Thundery showers will then develop over parts of the southwest overnight Thursday into Friday, spreading north across western and northern parts of the UK during Friday morning, before clearing. Hot, humid weather follows, likely above thresholds again in parts of eastern, southeastern and central England. Further afternoon and evening thunderstorms will then signal the breakdown on the very warm conditions, with cooler weather returning by Saturday.

Heat-Health Alert

The <u>Heat-Health Watch Service</u> is designed to help healthcare professionals manage during periods of hot weather. The service acts as an early warning system forewarning of periods of high temperatures, which may affect the health of the UK public. Hot Weather Warnings are sent to the Chief Executive of every Health Trust provider of NHS commissioned care, Local Authority and Social Care Organisation in England. The Heat-Health Watch Service operates in England from 1 June to 15 September each year, in association with Public Health England. This is the period when temperature thresholds are most likely to be reached. However, should thresholds for an alert be reached outside of this period, an extraordinary Heat-Health Alert will be issued and stakeholders are advised to take the usual public health actions.
